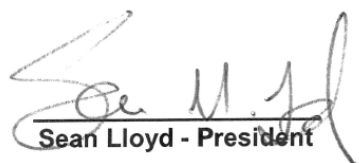

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Financial Statements are Special Purpose Financial Statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (QLD). The Managements Committee has determined that the Club is not a reporting entity.

The Financial Statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs, which we do not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements.

a) Income Tax

The Club's Management Committee believes that, under Section 50-45 of the Income Tax assessments Act 1997, the Club is exempt from Income Tax.

b) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and specific applicable grants. The depreciation amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

c) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income and expenditure statement.

d) Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, with the majority being valued using an average cost basis methodology.

e) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the Club's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less

g) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent

in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established. Grant, donation and insurance recovery income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt, except for when the income is to be used to purchase assets in future years it is recorded as a liability. If conditions are attached

to the grant that must be satisfied before the Club is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied. All revenue is stated

net of the amount of the goods and services tax (GST).

h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is

recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the assets and liabilities statements are shown inclusive of GST.

i) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Club has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

j) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

k) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Club during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Report on the Financial Report

We have audited the accompanying Financial Report, being a special purpose Financial Report, of Redlands Cricket Incorporated, which comprises the Management Committee's report, the balance sheet as at 31 December 2025, the income and expenditure statement for the year ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the certification of the members of the Management Committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial and performance of the Club.

Management Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Report

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the Management Committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the Financial Report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Independence

In conducting our audit, we have complied with the independence requirements of Australian professional ethical pronouncements.

Qualifications

As is normal procedure in organisations where reliance is placed upon voluntary labour, certain fund-raising activities are difficult to supervise. Accordingly, strict control procedures are not easy to implement, and no opinion can be expressed as to whether all income from these sources has been fully accounted for.

Auditors' Opinion

In our opinion, subject to the above qualifications, the Financial Report of Redlands Cricket Incorporated presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Redlands Cricket Incorporated as of 31 December 2025, and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements and the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Qld).

Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution

Without changing our opinion, we draw attention to Note 1 to the Financial Report, which describes the basis of accounting and revenue recognition. The Financial Report has been prepared to assist Redlands Cricket Incorporated to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) 1981. As a result, the Financial Report may not be suitable for other purposes.

Facilities and Assets

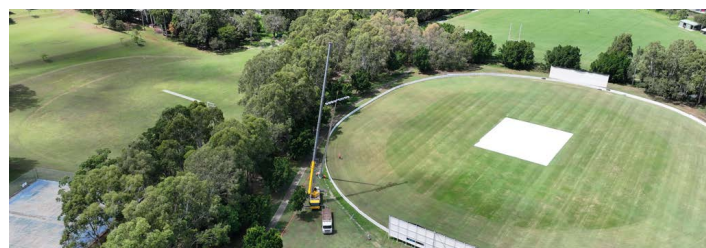

Despite interruptions and inconsistent momentum throughout the season, the side continued to compete hard each week and gained valuable experience against strong Premier Cricket opposition.

The longer two-day format provided opportunities for players to showcase patience, resilience, and adaptability, while also allowing several individuals to produce standout performances with both bat and ball.

A few highlights from the red-ball season:

- Jack Sonter was outstanding with the bat, finishing as the club's leading run scorer in the two-day competition with 446 runs at an average of 40.55, including two centuries throughout the season
- Carter Pearson produced one of the performances of the season, scoring a century and claiming a five-wicket haul in the same match — a remarkable all-round achievement
- Klinton Goodridge led the two-day bowling attack with 15 wickets at 22.6

The development of several younger players throughout the year was one of the great positives of the season. Exposure to the demands of Second Grade cricket provided invaluable experience and will continue to benefit the group moving forward.

The willingness of players to embrace different roles, support one another, and continue competing hard in difficult situations remained a defining feature of the side throughout the campaign. While the ladder positions may not fully reflect the effort shown by the group, the season laid important foundations for future growth.

As the club transitions into the 2026/27 season, the experience gained this year will place the side in a stronger position moving forward. With continued development and greater consistency, there is confidence this group can take significant strides in the seasons ahead.

The 2025/26 season was a competitive and encouraging one for Redlands Tigers 3rd Grade, with the group showing strong development across both formats despite challenging conditions. We finished 7th out of 10 in the two-day competition and 8th out of 10 in the one-day format, with results not always reflecting the quality of cricket played throughout the year.

In the two-day competition, we recorded 2 wins, 2 losses and 5 draws, with several fixtures heavily impacted by weather. The side showed early promise with two excellent wins to start the season. A composed chase saw us defeat Gold Coast by two wickets in Round 1, followed by another tight one-wicket victory in Round 2, highlighted by our fantastic Nepalese import Bibek Arjun's outstanding 5/11 and a calm, match-winning 75* from Vice Captain Jaiden Taylor. While weather interruptions made it difficult to build consistent momentum, the group remained resilient and competitive. There were several strong individual performances during this period, including Mitch Drennan's impressive 91 and Ezra Wolfik's 71 against Sandgate. The drawn match against Valleys was particularly frustrating, with the opposition batting for 102 overs and leaving insufficient time to force a result.

The one-day competition saw continued growth within the side. Although we faced some tough results, we played some very strong cricket, including a dominant eight-wicket win over Norths and a convincing seven-wicket victory against Wynnum. A narrow one-wicket loss to Gold Coast also highlighted how close the group was to achieving additional wins. One of the standout moments of the season came in Round 12, with Will Whatmore producing an exceptional innings of 102 off 82 balls, showcasing his talent and composure. He was a consistent performer across both formats and a key contributor to the team's batting success.

Throughout the season, we had 36 players represent the side, reflecting strong depth within the club and providing valuable opportunities for a number of emerging players. While this created some challenges with continuity, it was pleasing to see so many players step up and contribute when called upon. Playing conditions at Fred Kratzmann Oval were often very flat, making it difficult to take 10 wickets and force results. Despite this, our bowlers showed persistence and effort across the season, with several standout performances.

The 2025/26 season was overall a successful one for 4th grade. Across the board, it was probably the youngest crop of players we've fielded for many seasons, but despite this we were able to come within 6 runs of winning a one-day premiership and just missed out on finals in the two-day arena.

Our season started with a 12-run loss to Gold Coast at Andrew Symonds Oval in a match where we were asked to chase down 308 for victory, a score which would probably win you 9 out of 10 matches in itself.

In Round 3 we would then go down to Wests by 9 runs. Looking back on the season, had we been able to fall over the line in both, or maybe even just one of those games, we'd have earned a finals berth. Every season is full of "coulda, woulda, shoulda" moments though, and the key is just to learn from those missed opportunities and see what we can do better.

Our greatest two-day victory came against Wynnum at home in Round 6, the last match before Christmas, with a ton from the skipper and a 5fa from Ben Gahan leading the way. We took 6/60 to bowl them out more than 100 runs shy of our total. Some of that momentum would then carry into the one-day comp.

Finding a way to win from behind seemed to be a constant theme in our one-day campaign. After 3 rounds we found ourselves 1 from 3, and coming into the final round against Wynnum we needed a double bonus point to secure a finals berth. After bowling Wynnum out for 89, this seemed probable. We didn't make it easy on ourselves though, and Ben Gahan came in clutch, hitting the final ball of the 20th over for 4 to seal victory. Had we taken one ball longer, we don't play finals.

After copping a bruising from Gold Coast in the round fixture, we then had quite a spicy contest with them as well, with Gold Coast skipping out to a strong position early with the bat. We were able to peg them back, bowl them out for 218 and chase down their total in the 39th over.

Against Norths in the One-Day Grand Final, Dilip Nath produced the batting performance of the season, peeling off 101 in just 70 balls. He was well supported by Brandon Shailer, who hit 50 off 40 and also contributed 5/40 with the ball in a superb all-round effort. It wasn't enough though, and we fell 6 runs short of what would have been a finals run for the ages.

Needing to win probably 2 of the last 3 two-day matches, we started off well with a win against Norths but unfortunately didn't bring our best into the final two rounds, going down convincingly to eventual premiers Souths and then Uni in the final round, leaving us with a 6th-place finish.

Aside from the performances already mentioned, there were a number of other standout efforts and positives to take away from the season. With the bat, we saw a coming of age from Will Whatmore, scoring his maiden century against Toombul in Round 2 and backing that up with a 5fa against Wests the following round.

Jackson Williams showed his abilities consistently throughout the season, finishing with 341 runs at 34.1 before school cricket intervened. He played crucial roles at the top in the two-day fixtures and then in the middle order in the one-day competition.

Jake Matthews fell agonisingly short of a century, scoring 95 off 195 against Valleys in a match where we were 4/20 at one stage.

It would be fair to say one of the most improved players of the season was Brandon Shailer, who not only performed strongly with the ball but also scored 292 runs at 43 with the bat from positions 8 to 10, proving his dependable all-round ability. He would go on to play the second half of the season in 3's as a reward for his efforts.

Will Cassell, who initially was looking to focus on Taverners only, ended up playing nearly every match with us this season and put in some strong performances with the ball. His ability to swing it both ways was a great asset, and he was rewarded with 5/42 in the final round against Uni, eventually topping our wickets tally with 26 for the season.

As mentioned earlier, Ben Gahan was a strong performer as well, finishing with 23 wickets (just 3 behind Will) as well as 190 runs with the bat. Ben even received opportunities to open the batting, scoring a 50 against Norths with patience and application.

In summary, it could be easy to look at this as a season of "what ifs". However, I would prefer to view it as a window into the promising talent that is coming through. Premierships are often won when you get the right mix of youth and experience, along with buy-in to team culture. Without a few more senior players, it was expected that there were going to be times where we fell a bit short.

What was great to see was everyone buy into the idea of winning a premiership early in the season and, most of all, enjoy each other's company.

I would like to give credit to all players for playing passionately, and I have no doubt we will see this crop of players continue to improve and develop over the coming seasons.

The 2025/26 6th grade season showcased a youthful side, where many (12!) were having their first taste of senior grade cricket. Their task was to have confidence and know they earned the right to be in the side, wanting to perform for their team. Consistency was our most challenging aspect as our results varied throughout the season.

The first round we posted a competitive total of 247 vs Uni (2), courtesy of a dominant innings from Louis Sivewright 91 (87). However, some ill discipline with bowling and catching, Uni (2) made light work of the chase. We could post another two consecutive 200+ scores, beating Toombul and Wests, both games within reach of outright victories but falling short due to weather. Those missed outright opportunities would hurt us later in the season. Standout performances vs Wests were Chase Melville's 5fer (5/22 off 7.4) and Hayden Sheppard's gutsy 85 (137).

The following 2 rounds were weather affected again, drawing and then lost against some restrictive bowling from Wynnum Manly. Injuries, player availability and school cricket tested our depth significantly and our momentum faded to 8th in the Two-Day competition as the season continued. Notable performances during this period were Bailey Engler's 65 (93) holding onto a draw vs top-of-the-table Souths and Mekhi Hunter's hat-trick (4/13 off 4) in the last round.

Our One-Day campaign was fruitful in securing a semi-final (4th) winning 3 of the 5 games. Louis Sivewright's bullish innings 53 (50) vs Toombul helped obtain an effective bonus point chasing 93 within 20 overs. Our other two wins were solid with everyone collectively chipping in and two losses highlighted our batting depth being tested with quality bowling.

The semi-final vs Northern Suburbs was tough not being able to put out a full-strength side and it showed when we won the toss to bowl on a conducive wicket, but couldn't stem the flow of runs, bowling them out for 214 off 38 overs. A standout effort from Jed Jury with 5/40 off his 7 overs, who consistently utilised the variable pitch conditions to his advantage. Taking a 5fer in a One-Day final is by no means a small feat. Our team struggled to get the innings underway, needing more than five an over when Northern Suburbs demonstrated quality application with the ball. We could only manage 116 in the end.

Numerous players' successes were developing their game and gaining deeper understanding of their roles and performances. I think leading the 6th grade team, you get spoiled seeing the infant stages of such players and where their playing journey progresses. 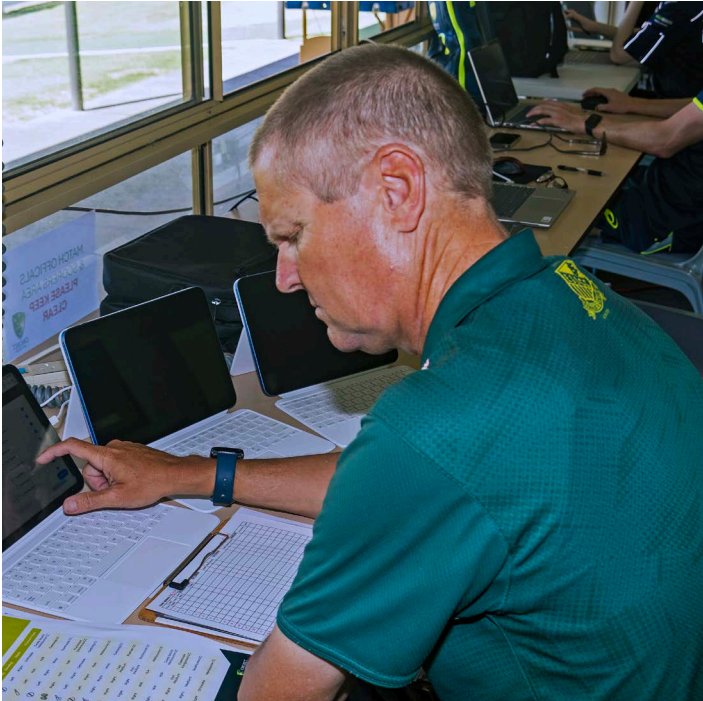

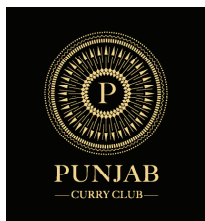
